Two-hour rule in the EA Manager's contract

The CAO explained that, as the Board directed staff to work on items within the Strategic Plan and other projects by way of Board resolution, staff have to ensure they remain focused on these tasks. The electoral area directors may delegate work to the Electoral Area Manager at any time and the Electoral Area Manager may spend as much time as needed on these projects. The twohour rule only applies when the Electoral Area Manager requires the assistance of other staff for more than two hours. As staff will have to shift focus to a project solely of an electoral area nature, without prior approval of the Board, it will mean they will be taken away from projects delegated by the Board. As such, if at any time staff are asked to assist the Electoral Area Manager with a project not delegated by the Board that requires more than two hours, staff will request that the Electoral Area Directors' Committee refer it to the Board for authorization to proceed.

Another query I have is about the programs to provide high speed internet. I have had a request from the people at Shepards Inn mile 72. The NWT fibre optic line runs right past the Inn but because they are in Telus serving area (which ends technically at mile 73) it is difficult to get an agreement for NWT to provide the service. Very frustrating for the residents.

There was a bit of a study done and the cost to provide the drop service to the SI would be about \$200,000. Of course it is not within their price range. About 20 homes plus the Inn which has 20 + rooms, café and small convenience store.

I would like to find out if there is some way of assisting them. Maybe in the grant process that was in place for the Telus's of the area to provide service?

# **RECOMMENDATION(S):**

That the Electoral Area Directors Committee recommend to the Peace River Regional District Board to accept the Locality Boundaries as provided by Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations – GeoBC.

# **BACKGROUND/RATIONALE:**

On March 16, 2017 staff provided background information and the rationale for reviewing, potentially amending, and adopting the Digital Road Atlas Locality Boundaries. The Electoral Area Directors Committee provided the following resolution:

"That the Electoral Area Directors' Committee recommends to the Regional Board that the Electoral Area Directors review the Digital Road Atlas (DRA) map and consider amending the existing Provincial DRA Locality Boundaries to better represent community boundaries and that the amended map be brought back to the Electoral Area Directors' Committee for final review and recommendation to the Board."

#### **CARRIED**

On July 20, 2017 staff requested direction from the Electoral Area Directors regarding the Locality Boundaries. On August 17, 2017 staff provided detailed maps of each Electoral Area to the Directors and have received no proposed boundary amendments to date.

**Subject: Grant Writer Options** 

## **RECOMMENDATION(S):**

That the Electoral Area Directors recommend to the Board that the Electoral Areas partner with municipalities in the region to contract a regional grant writer.

# **BACKGROUND/RATIONALE:**

As of December 31, 2017 the North Peace Economic Development Commission will be decommissioned, and the contract for the current Grant Writer Program will come to end. The four Electoral Area Directors have requested the Electoral Area Manager contact Northern Development Initiative Trust (NDIT) in order to find out more information regarding grants available through NDIT to the electoral areas should the Directors decide to continue the program.

NDIT is an independent, non-profit corporation which operates independently from government and provides the funding and ability to identify and pursue new opportunities for stimulating economic growth and job creation within the region through investments in grassroots, community-led projects.

NDIT offers a Grant Writing Support program that will provide up to \$8,000 in rebate funding each year to support the employment of a locally based grant writer. The expectation from NDIT is that for **each** grant awarded, the grant will be topped up with an additional \$2,500 for wages or contract payments, and the Grant Writer is to spend a minimum of 400 hours on grant writing services and must apply for a minimum of \$200,000 of in grant applications during the calendar year. This grant is only available for local governments and First Nations bands in the Trust's service region.

To date, the North Peace Economic Development Commission (NPEDC) has been utilizing the NDIT Grant Writer Program for the North Peace region. The Grant Writer Program is comprised of representation from Electoral Areas B and C, Hudson's Hope, Taylor and Fort St. John. Each year, the NPEDC Officer would submit an application to NDIT on behalf of Hudson's Hope, Taylor, Fort St John and the PRRD. The grant money is then pooled together to hire one full time professional Grant Writer to service the North Peace as a whole.

The purpose of the Grant Writer Program is to help support and encourage North Peace non-profit community groups and First Nations to apply and make application for grant funding. When a client is interested in applying for a grant, the client meets with the Grant Writer to discuss the project and provide information. The Grant Writer will then research possible grants the client can apply for and if the client agrees, the Grant Writer will write and submit the grant application on behalf of the client. The Grant Writer will also provide follow up assistance if requested by the client.

Previous discussions between staff and community groups have indicated that without the help of a grant writer, community groups are faced with various challenges when applying for grants. Two of the biggest challenges identified are web-based technology and the application and completion process. In addition, the following barriers were identified:

- Compatibility of software requirements to navigate, download and upload files
- Strength and viability of the internet connection
- So much information is on the website, hard to navigate and identify what you need
- Understanding technology based language
- Grant applications are lengthy and so in-depth that they are intimidating and overwhelming
- Supporting documentation financials, resolutions of support, other funding sources
- Too time consuming and takes too long to complete
- Reporting requirements and process is too involved
- Knowing how to put all the information together to ensure a successful outcome.
- Eligibility criteria

Earlier in 2017, a survey was sent out to community groups in order to find out more information regarding their knowledge and involvement with applying for grants and whether or not there would be a need to continue the grant writer program. Results are as follows:

#### In just Area B & C:

- Non-profit community groups and First Nations have been involved in 147 projects
- Some of these projects have been carried forward from year to year, with approximately 74 unique project
- 764 grant applications have been submitted between 2010 and July 31, 2017
- About 5% of submitted grant applications have been approved.
- About 9% of total funding grant applications have been approved.

#### **OPTIONS:**

1. That the Electoral Area Directors recommend to the Board that the Electoral Areas partner with Municipalities to contract a Regional Grant Writer.

Discussion: According to the current Grant Writer, having one Grant Writer for the entire region is possible if the person is well organized. If all of the municipalities were to join in on a Regional Grant Writer there would be the option to receive up to \$56,000 in grants from NDIT plus the additional \$8,000 that the PRRD would be eligible for. When you add in the requirement to top up each grant by \$2,500, that would give a total of up \$84,000 that could be used to offset the cost of the grant writer service to the tax payers and would provide sufficient funding for in region travel. If after one year the Regional District found that the program was not working, we could look at having a different model based on need such as two Grant Writers that service the North and South Peace or organizations in the rural and municipal areas.

2. Make a request to the Board to submit an application to NDIT to receive a grant up to \$8,000 that if successful will be used to hire a contract rural grant writer.

Discussion: If this option is chosen the majority of the cost of the contract would be covered by the four Electoral Area Directors but this would allow the Grant Writer could focus all of their attention on the needs of the rural communities. Given that the current cost of the North Peace Grant Writer is \$50,000, it is estimated that a rural grant writer would be a similar cost leaving a short-fall of \$42,000 that would have to be obtained through taxation.

3. Discontinue the Grant Writer Service.

Discussion: Not recommended based on the information listed above.

#### STRATEGIC PLAN RELEVANCE: None

### **FINANCIAL CONSIDERATION(S):**

The Cost of the Grant Writer will depend on proposals received through a RFP process. The current Grant Writer has a contract wage of \$50,000 for the calendar year. Grants received from NDIT in the amount of \$32,000 for the PRRD, Hudson's Hope, Taylor and Fort St. John Grant Writer Grant help pay this contract. If partnerships continue, then there will be multiple opportunities for NDIT grants to offset the cost to tax payers.
