Grant Writer Service Overview

The Peace River Regional District values not-for-profit community groups and recognizes the hard work that they do. Often, community groups rely on fundraising and grants in order to undertake new projects or services that benefit us all. Grant writing can be both overwhelming and time consuming. In most cases, not-for-profit community groups do not have the time, resources, nor expertise to research and apply for grants.

The Grant Writer works with the PRRD and not-for-profit community groups in the region to research grant opportunities, develop and submit grant applications, and to provide advice and guidance regarding grant applicability and eligibility, and to work with groups to ensure that their grant applications include all required documentation.

Grant Writing Services

What the Grant Writer Does

The Grant Writer Service involves consulting with various community groups to:

- Identify potential non PRRD funding opportunities.
- Define project goals.
- Develop a work plan and budget for the project.
- Obtain the required information and documentation to prepare the grant application.
- Develop the grant proposals and applications.
- Submit the funding applications.



Who the Grant Writer Works For

The Peace River Regional District's Grant Writer Service is a free service for not-for-profit organizations within the Peace River Regional District.

Examples of not-for-profit community groups include, but are not limited to, not-for-profit registered societies, church groups, community hall operators, fall fair associations, museum associations, not-for-profit tourism providers, sports groups, emergency services associations, school parent advisory committees and organizations providing services for the relief of poverty.



Grant Application Criteria

Grant funders have different eligibility criteria when it comes to who can apply for a grant. Not-for-profits can benefit from obtaining valuable information on the best way to position themselves to qualify for available funding. In most cases there are specific requirements that need to be in place before a funding application is actually submitted.

This is an example of where the Grant Writer can assist and steer community groups in the right direction. Common reasons why proposals are not successful include:

- Poorly conceived idea.
- Too vague, too general.
- Weak budget.
- Timeline not feasible.
