# LOCAL GOVERNMENT Hudson's Hope

- 1. What do you think the role of Regional Parks within the Regional District is? (Why do we need them? What is their function?) To coordinate and enhance parks throughout the region as well as promote a consistent, safe and a healthy year-round outdoor experience for local and out of area visitors alike.

It is recommended that the Ministry of Agriculture's "A Guide to Using and Developing Trails in Farm and Ranch Areas" be used in park planning and design.



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In addition it should be noted that subdivision for park or trail development requires the submission of a subdivision application for the Commission's review. Natural park uses are permitted outright in the ALR as per B.C. Regulation #171/2002.

Developed parkland, such as playing fields also requires the Commission's review and approval through a non farm use application process. B.C. Regulation #171/2002 and application forms may be accessed from our website at <a href="https://www.alc.gov.bc.ca">www.alc.gov.bc.ca</a>

- Some trail groups have to deal with Agricultural Land Reserve to get their trails registered
- Some groups have trouble with mapping trails perhaps some funding can be made available for mapping trails
- There is new legislation that oil and gas companies have to consult with Recreation Sites and Trails BC before proceeding on existing trails
- There is a need for signage / education to deal with horse / ATV / hiking conflicts



- Mapping is available of some trails in the area
- The Parks and Trails Master Plan can address / assist with directing groups in the right direction to make applications for trail registration

### **RCMP**

Kootenay Planning Consultants met with RCMP members from Chetwynd and Fort St. John prior to the open house session on October 21, 2011. The following are notes taken at the meeting:

- RCMP do not have enough resources / budget to enforce bylaws in regional parks and will only respond to emergencies
- The RCMP are there to support the BC Parks Enforcement Officer
- As far as the RCMP know, Blackfoot Park has no real issues, only graduation weekend
- The PRRD bylaw says there is a fee for camping but it is never enforced
- There is currently no cell phone service in Blackfoot Park for emergency purposes
- In terms of boating, RCMP is only reactive, there is no patrolling rivers or lakes
- There is currently no vicious dog bylaw so RCMP cannot act on these issues
- ATV-ing currently this activity is not an issue with RCMP. ATV's need a
  license plate to cross roads but they cannot get a license if the ATV is not
  used for commercial purposes. RCMP in FSJ have used quads to patrol
  "trouble" areas within city limits to some success
- RCMP does not need to review DRAFT Master Plan.

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# I. BACKGROUND

# Introduction

The Peace River Regional District (PRRD) Residents Needs and Wants Survey, was launched on August 9, 2011 as part of the 'Public Engagement' process for the development of the PRRD Parks & Trails Master Plan. The survey was available to the residents of the PRRD in hard copy or online format. The survey was posted as a link on the PRRD website and was available at both the Dawson Creek and Fort St. John PRRD offices in hard copy form. The survey responses were collected for just over a three month period closing on November 15th, 2011. The survey was designed to provide feedback in the following areas:

- user opinions on their needs and wants for the management, improvement and future expansion of the Regional Park system and
- ideas regarding opportunities for Regional District support for recreational trails within the PRRD area.

In total, 270 surveys were completed of which 77% (or 208) were filled out in hard copy.

The link to the online survey was emailed to stakeholder group contacts for the distribution to their members and the survey was promoted during several of the local Fall Fairs. A total of 11 Open Houses were held throughout the PRRD from October 17-28, 2011. PRRD residents who attended the Open House events were encouraged to complete a survey either in hard copy or online. These events offered another chance to connect with the user groups where individual members took the survey information back to their groups for more people to complete. A noticeable increase in the number of surveys completed and submitted occurred during and immediately after the Open House events. The PRRD provided advertisement in several local newspapers and on the local radio stations to promote the survey and Open House events. A copy of the survey is attached in Appendix A.

# **Purpose of Survey**

A Wants & Needs survey is an important component of the public engagement portion in the development of a Master Plan. Surveys, of any kind including a Wants & Needs survey, provide an effective way of obtaining a wide spectrum of public input. Knowing what the residents of the PRRD want is a key factor in successfully establishing a long-range planning document to guide the management of the PRRD Regional Parks and Trails system. Surveys, online or hard copy are relatively inexpensive ways of finding out what the public thinks



while allowing respondents to answer the questions at their leisure, answer sensitive questions anonymously and provide their opinions without having to go to a public meeting.

# Methodology

The Wants & Needs survey was designed using the online software, "SurveyGizmo" (<a href="www.Surveygizmo.com">www.Surveygizmo.com</a>). The survey questions were designed to gather information from the PRRD residents, as users and non-users of the five existing Regional Parks, their management, maintenance and future improvements as well as the potential expansion of the Regional Parks system. The survey was also designed to collect opinions on how the Regional District could support the recreational trail systems within the PRRD area. The questions were developed with feedback and input from the PRRD staff and PRRD Parks Committee.

To achieve the results wanted the survey was divided into three (3) distinct sections: (1) Parks, (2) Trails, and (3) Demographics. Survey respondents were asked to respond to questions covering the following topics:

- Regional Parks or Trails visited;
- indicate how and how often they used the parks or trails;
- provide information on their perceived values of the parks and trails;
- provide opinions on additional amenities needed at the existing parks;
- provide ideas for potential locations for new parks and trails;
- prioritize the maintenance needs or improvement needs of the Regional parks and trails; and
- respond to funding options.

In order to improve the survey response rate, incentives were offered to those who completed and submitted a survey by providing draw prizes (two IPOD Shuffles) one on October 19 and one on November 15, 2011.

# **Data Analysis**

The data collected from the Wants & Needs survey was analyzed by the SurveyGizmo software. The results below summarize the responses of each question by highlighting the key themes that emerged out of each question.

# **Research Limitations**

It should be noted that although 270 surveys were submitted not all questions were answered by every respondent. The percentages shown are based on the 270 responses where possible. The actual number of response per question



varies as in some cases respondents chose not to answer a particular question or in other questions respondents were given the option of providing more than one response. Where questions allowed the respondents to provide additional suggestions in the 'Other' category the answered are listed after each question. The list of general respondent suggestions and comments asked for in the last question, Question 25 is included at the end of this document. The results from the survey will provide the bases for the direction and the statistical back-up of the Parks & Trails Master Plan recommendations.

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


# How often within the past year have you visited a Regional Park within the Peace River Regional District?






# What is your satisfaction level in regard to the parks you have visited?






- Respondent users indicate they are satisfied with the facilities at Blackfoot.


- Respondent/users indicated they were unsatisfied-neutral in rating the facilities at Montney.




- Respondent/users indicated they were neutral in the satisfactory level of the park facilities.


- The facilities within the park were ranked as 'satisfied' by the user/respondents.


# In your opinion, what is the most important role of Regional Parks?







# Do you support additional park investments in Regional Parks?




If a special property tax was created to solely fund parkland acquisitions for the Regional Parks within the Peace River Regional District, how much of a tax increase would you support?








The most documented "limitation" for people to encounter while using Regional Trails were "Time" and "Lack of information".

- "Conflict with other users" was chosen less than 9% of the time for what limits people from using the existing trails.






### What is your satisfaction level with the existing trails within the Peace River Regional District?




- "Signage" was chosen 43% of the time for what people felt they were "Not satisfied" in existing trails.

#### In your opinion, what is the most important role of Regional Trails?




- "Provide opportunities for outdoor recreation for local residents" was chosen 83% of the time as a "Very important" role of the Regional Trails.




### Do you support investment in Regional Trails within the Peace River Regional District?

### If a Grant Funding Program was established to support organized trail user groups, in what capacity should the support be directed?





If a special property tax was created to solely fund the development of Regional Trails within the Peace River Regional District, how much of a tax increase would you support?






#### Please specify if you are male or female.

#### What are of the Peace River Regional District do you live in?




#### What age group do you belong to?

We have not been to other regional parks because there are none close to FSJ. There is great potential for hiking, viewing etc. along the Beatton River and Peace River, both of which could be significant tourist attractions as well as amenities for area residents.

ATV'S must be restricted in certain areas. Parks need to have enforcement or this will not work anywhere.

Support groups that are putting effort into their own trails projects. They will multiply your dollars.

Spencer Tuck need to improve cement ramp into the lake for boat launching of heavy boats including sailboats - need bike, walk, non motorized trail from Dawson Creek to Taylor

I would like to see more parks, more trails and a system to maintain public safety and enjoyment. I would suggest forming a group of Volunteer Park Wardens to help keep the park usage as intended and not abused by people who may not have any consideration for other park users. As an Army Cadet Officer, I am always looking for local areas to use for camping, hiking, winter recreation, etc. Engaging local user groups to help develop and maintain parks and trails could help build community stewardship of PRRD Facilities. We are lucky to live in such a beautiful area, and anything we can do to teach our youth to appreciate and protect our parks and trails in the future will benefit everyone.

Collaborative efforts with BC Parks, FSJ or fed gov to fund an access point and trail development and expansion of existing Peace River Corridor Provincial Park. Adding other linear parks/trails anywhere in PRRD - Beatton, Peace River, Kiskatinaw, etc to provide non-motorized recreational opportunity.

We've been using provincial and municipal (FSJ, Taylor, Dawson Creek) parks because we really were not aware of the RD ones. Even Info Centre did not inform us about them. We'll definitely check them out.

Non aggressive tires on atv and bikes. They tear up too much ground. I would like to see new parks on Crown Land only - no tax increase.

The Regional District owned the park on the Beatton River on the Cecil lake Road & gave it up. That park was well used and was abandoned because......?? Why not put that first on the agenda??

How will local community organizations be involved in Regional Park improvements? How will the PTMP be formally incorporated in the new Rural Comprehensive Plan? How will/can other former Min of Forests Rec Areas, Prov Protected Areas or potential new Rec sites from MoF previously identified be linked into the PTMP?

At Swan Lake I would like to see users using less motorized venues, have new trails for walking, cycling etc. Winter use - trails would be convenient for walking, camping etc. The south side of Swan Lake could be utilized in winter / summer seasons if the park contained less deadfall dead trees add more trails, there is one now

(ie: The Regional District may be able to offer "free" overnight camping at the expense of the taxpayer. We need to charge people to use our facilities because we have overhead expenses and need to make a living and pay our property taxes!)

# Peace River Regional District Open House SUMMARY

#### **Open House Event Overview**

The purpose of the Open House events throughout the PRRD during the weeks of October 17-28, 2011 was to do the following:

- create awareness about the Regional Parks and Trails in the PRRD
- gather input from local residents through dialogue
- encourage residents to fill out the survey
- assist local user groups (where possible) to fundraise and create awareness

Eleven Open House events were held at Community Halls, schools, recreation centres and arenas throughout the Regional District including at: Chetwynd, Dawson Creek, Doe River, Tumbler Ridge, McLeod, Fort St. John, Clearview, Buick, Wonowon, Hudson's Hope and Tomslake.

Presentation panels were displayed and guests were engaged through informal conversation. There were seven presentation panels made up of the following:

Panel 1: EXISTING "LEAF US A MESSAGE" POSTER

Panel 2: EXISTING INTRODUCTION POSTER

Panel 3-5: OUTLINES / INVENTORIES OF EXISTING REGIONAL PARKS (two parks per panel)

Panel 6: TRAILS INFORMATION PANEL

Panel 7: THANK YOU FOR PARTICIPATING, CONTACT INFORMATON, ENCOURAGMENT TO FILL OUT SURVEY

Each event was approximately 2 to 3 hours in length. At many of the events coffee, tea and treats were offered to the public who came out to talk and share their thoughts on Parks & Trails within the PRRD.

Both Kathleen Wilker and Shannon Gadsby of Kootenay Planning consultants attended each Open House and were accompanied by at least one PRRD staff member; primarily Trish Morgan or Fran Haughian and often a representative of the PRRD Parks Committee, Fred Jarvis.

A total of 81 people signed in at the eleven Open House events. The average person per event was 7. The Fort St. John event at the Leisure Centre, which coincided with the FSJ Farmers Market, had the largest turn out with 20 people signing in.

The following information was gathered at the Open House events through note-taking by the consultants and PRRD staff.

#### **Regional Parks – General Comments**

The majority of individuals that we spoke to knew very little about the Regional Parks within PRRD with many others indicating they "did not know they existed". If participants knew about the regional parks their comments centred on: the lack of



information available about the parks and lack of adequate visible signage directing them to the parks starting at the major highways all the way into the park itself. Most people who knew about the parks had visited at least one or two of them at some point. Some of the general comments we heard in regards to parks within the PRRD were that "parks are great as long as they are maintained and they don't attract party-goers or vandals". This was often followed with comments like; "before the PRRD invests in any new parks, they need to clean up the existing ones". Many people felt that the existing parks should be improved and made more accessible to all the residents of the PRRD. The term "accessible" appeared to mean: safe, secure, welcoming to all and a pleasant place to visit. Some individuals felt that the "maintenance in the regional parks has gone down which makes the vandalism go up". This lead to the question: "does neglect in parks eventually cost more to repair then regular maintenance?" and also this question: "in all the parks, does the cost to repair the vandalism exceed the cost of hiring seasonal attendants?"

Another individual pointed out that all of the existing parks represent "only one type of environment or ecosystem". It was implied that there is no diversity in the types of parks and if more parks are added they should represent the diversity of environments and ecosystems of the PRRD.

Many locations were suggested for new regional parks from all corners of the Regional District. They included the following:

- day use area along all of the rivers for boat launches, especially the Pine River, Beatton and others;
- the Sikoat Chief Bridge area could be identified as an 'historical park' and could include the old (original) highway cut that still exists;
- Quality Lake in partnership with the Province;
- Murray Lake as a water access only park to be maintained by a group such as the "River Rats";
- Half-way Graham;
- Windfall Lake or Pinnacle Ridge near Tumbler Ridge;
- the Flatbed Tracks area including the Flatbed Falls;
- Tepee Falls;
- the 'Old Rocky Mountain Fort' site near Hudson's Hope. There are still remains of the building foundations in the ground. This is the site of the oldest know Caucasian settlement in BC upstream of the Moberly River;
- the Moresy Creek area where the original Hudson's Hope town site was located by Simon Fraser;
- a park at Dinosaur Lakes featuring the 'Heat Vents' in partnership with the District of Hudson's Hope;



- anywhere along Peace on crown land within the 'flood reserve' area;
- access to the Peace for day use and boating;
- along the river bottoms, in native grassland areas etc.;
- somewhere at Cecil Lake to improve public access to the lake. Ducks Unlimited has land that could be partnered with in some way;
- Ducks Unlimited also has lands around Siphon Creek Road, wetlands NE of Fort
   St. John that partnership could be developed for parks;
- the 'Old Fort Site' at Fort St. John. To take advantage of river recreation close to Fort St. John, to celebrate the history of the PRRD;
- the cemetery down by the Fort is a great park-like area;
- the site of the historic massacre at one of the Old Forts near where the Beatton meets the Peace;
- locals around Wonowon would like to see a Regional Park up in that area of the PRRD;
- Neg Falls near Buick;
- Crying Girl Prairie;
- German Lake;
- land at the end of Dokie Road;
- make the Fort St. John Lookout a regional park.

A strong comment that an individual made was that he/she "does not ever want to see a park near the Copeland Beach area again".

Several comments were made in regard to the old Beatton River Park:

- "There used to be a park at Beatton River, why did they close it?"
- "We love that area"
- "It's so sad it's no longer a park"

Many individuals noted that the information in the book "BC Backroad Mapbook – Northern BC" is incorrect as is shows the decommissioned Beatton River Park and the Copeland Park, this should be addressed.

The Fort St. John Army Cadets indicated they visit and use the amenities of most of the regional parks for all sorts of activities. They suggested that they would be happy to become involved in volunteering to maintain them in some manner.

Regional Parks – Specific



#### **Blackfoot Regional Park**

According to what the consulting team heard at the Open House events, Blackfoot is the most well-known Regional Park in the PRRD with a good number of people not only knowing about it but having visited it as some point. It is well-known for its 'grad party' weekend at the end of June every year. Many people stay away from the park on that weekend and most long-weekends as it has a reputation for non-family friendly, loud disrespectful activities. Having said that, everyone believes it is in a beautiful spot and has the potential to be a welcoming and user-friendly park. BC Hydro indicated that they anticipate installing the new boat launch in the spring of 2012. The design includes a well needed parking area for boat trailers and vehicles. Blackfoot Regional Park is most commonly used for camping and ATV.

Specific comments on Blackfoot Regional Park include:

- the garbage containers need to be in good order and there need to be more of them or they need to be emptied more often (currently the maintenance providers only pick up garbage once per week);
- overflowing garbage cans are a bear attractant;
- considering Blackfoot is FREE it is a good park and users appreciate that it is free;
- would like to see more campsites created. About 10 more would be perfect;
- would like to see "more work put into the entire park";
- park lends itself to ATV use so develop trails in and around the park. Get quad club involved to maintain trails;
- toilets are old and need replacing. The river road toilet was unusable in early summer this year due to a fly problem;
- Area Director doesn't hear too many complains about Blackfoot;
- frac-ing companies fill up at the 'Agricultural Only' water tap creating long lineups of big trucks around the playground and park area;
- there is an area around tank loading that would make a good picnic or day-use area;
- some day-use users of Blackfoot go there for bird-watching opportunities but avoid popular weekends because of the noise and people roaring around on ATV's;
- there is a perception that many of the users of Blackfoot are destroying the environment by mud-bogging, burning of vehicles which are then dumped into the Peace River;
- "Blackfoot is not well maintained. The grass is too high and there is always garbage everywhere";
- there is a general feeling that Blackfoot needs more monitoring;
- if you had to pay at Blackfoot, maybe security would be better;



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- "Would a paid attendant take too much abuse?"
- local land owners have concerns with ATVers trespassing on private lands close to Blackfoot Park as they search for trails in the area;
- More and better signage would be nice; and,
- horseback riding was also mentioned by several people as something they have done at Blackfoot.

It was suggested that BC Hydro owns the land on the west side of the bridge. If this true it is welcome as it provides an accessible location for overflow camping on busy weekends.

#### **Spencer Tuck Regional Park**

Spencer Tuck Regional Park appears to be a well-used and popular park for the immediate locals surrounding the park. The park apparently is used by school groups and church groups for special events and activities throughout the year with skating in the winter and picnics in the summer. The general public appears to use the park year-round as well for the boat launch in the summer and snowmobiles in the winter. Occasionally there are buoys put in the water to define a safe swimming area. Amenities that would be welcomed by the user groups are:

- improved washroom facilities;
- picnic table upgrades;
- a camp kitchen or picnic shelter;
- boat-launch improvements; and
- better signage from the highway into the park.

The maintenance providers indicate that there has never been a problem with too much garbage at the park. The users think that there are opportunities to develop trails from the park up to the existing power lines and beyond for hikers, ATVers and snowmobilers. Some members of the public suggested that the sign improvements include the information about the boat launch. Displaying more historic information on who Spencer Tuck was and his impact on the entire Peace River region was suggested as a way to enhance the park and increase interest in the park.

The locals feel the Cairn area on the highway is a problem area for vandalism and garbage as it is poorly maintained. They feel that there is a possibility for the PRRD to take control over that site and add it to the park for better maintenance.

#### **Sundance Regional Park**

Sundance Regional Park, although the newest park, is the second most 'well-known' park in the PRRD Regional Park system. Most users like the park for the fishing



opportunities in both summer and winter. Everyone who has visited the park commented positively about the toilet facility. Comments about Sundance focused on the possible expansion to the west to include a camping area and easier access to the lake. Additional signage was also a suggestion for Sundance.

#### **Montney Centennial Regional Park**

Montney Centennial Park appears to have the most potential for improvement and increased use. Currently it is primarily used for camping in the summer and as a base for the snowmobile club in the winter. Several Buick locals mentioned that they frequent Montney Centennial Regional Park most often out of all of the Regional parks due to its proximity for the fishing and snowmobiling. Most of the public that attended the Open Houses commented that the recreational opportunities on Charlie Lake are limited because of the extensive weed situation in the lake. Boating for pleasure or waterskiing/tubing are not pleasant activities in the lake so are therefore not done there. Fishing is a common activity on and around the lake including from Montney Centennial Park.

Along with the annual Regional District staff clean up and check of Montney Centennial Park the local Charlie Lake Conservation Society includes the clean-up of the park area in their annual lake area spring clean-up as well. In the past few years they have removed large items from the park area such as 'bed springs' and other old pieces of equipment. Many people who attended the Open Houses would like to see the following at Montney:

- better signage to the park from the highway;
- more camping at Montney;
- less gravel in the camping area;
- a more organized layout for camping, "not just a gravel strip";
- a dock to fish off of;
- a 'designated' day-use picnic area;
- a playground with "monkey bars"; and,
- trails in the park "like those in Beatton Provincial Park down the road".

#### Minaker Regional Park

Minaker Regional Park is the least known park in the Regional Park system. Even those who knew of it could not always find it as the signage to the park is so poor. The Wonowon locals historically used Minaker Regional Park for their annual Gymkhana events but haven't done so for the last couple of years due to lack of volunteer organizers. Other users are campers who are up in the area for hunting purposes.



#### **Recreational Trails**

Even though the PRRD does not own, maintain or manage any recreational trails within its geographic area, most of the conversations at the Open Houses centred on trails - their development, uses, concerns and needs. We learned that there are many kilometers of recreational trail existing throughout the PRRD. Some of these recreational trails are designated, well-maintained and very popular. Other recreational trails are informal well used and well loved, while others are located on private lands and their use often causes problems.

We had the opportunity to speak directly with several of the organized trail user groups; from horseback riders, to hikers, ATVers, snowmobilers, mountain bikers and cross-country skiers. We also spoke with several members of the general public and their ideas for recreational trails within the Regional District area.

The primary support for recreational trails within the PRRD is from Tim Bennett, the Forest Recreation Officer with the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resources Operations. Mr. Bennett administers the efforts required to 'designate' a recreational trail within an area that includes the PRRD. The trail users groups we spoke to all commented on the excellent support and encouragement that Tim has provided over the years as the various groups work through the trail registration process. Mr. Bennett provided us with several comments and suggestions on recreational trail development and designation drawing on his experience with many groups over the past several years. Mr. Bennett noted that some of the groups often have trouble with the mapping requirement for their trails and suggested that funding for this specific item would be a huge benefit to the groups. In general terms, Mr. Bennett sees the need for signage and education to help market, promote and mitigate user conflicts on trails. The new legislation that requires Oil and Gas companies to consult with registered recreational trail maintainers prior to any industrial interference with these recreational trails is a huge improvement in Mr. Bennett's eyes in avoiding future conflicts and negative feelings between the recreational users and the area's industries.

The general comments from the Open House participants regarding recreational trails included the following:

- money should be put into multiuse trails in the PRRD;
- private land owners continue to have problems and concerns with trespassers on their lands especially from ATVers and snowmobilers;
- private land owners would like to be notified if a trail is proposed for development near their property;
- owners of large tracts of land would like us to clearly define what we mean by 'trail' as they want to ensure that we are only talking about recognized trails



primarily on crown land. These farmer/ranchers would like us to keep people off private lands even if an 'old historical' trail crosses it. "It is still private land!";

- the trails need to be available to alternate user groups like, dog-sledders;
- "My sons love the mountain bike trails near FSJ but the parking should be improved as it is dangerous";
- "Could we work with CP Rail on using the old rail right of ways and bridges for trails?"
- "Could we work with the Ministry of Transportation on developing trails for multi-use within their highway right of ways?"
- "Could we approach the Ministry of Transportation about designing the ditches to accommodate horseback riding?"
- "How do we get permission to make a recreational trail?"
- many local user groups would like help with the removal of dangerous trees or pine beetle kill;
- on a whole, people thought "more ATV trails" are needed;
- "There are quad users near FSJ that inappropriately use the hiking trails instead of going further out to the real quad trails";
- generally the public needs to be educated on the proper respectful use of all trails. Land owners and trail users feel there is often a lack of understanding on the impact on the rural area. There is a lack of education and even compassion for landowners and the environment or the effects of their use of the trail on the adjacent landowners;
- there seems to be a need to educate how trail users can spread invasive weeds and ways to stop this; and
- generally the people who attended the Open Houses appreciate the suggestion for more support for the trails.

The areas that many people would like to see trails developed is broad and vast. The list of potential sites as suggested by those who attended the Open Houses is shown below:

- a non-motorized trail from Dawson Creek to Taylor;
- a trail from Charlie Lake to Fort St. John (already in the works with the Charlie Lake Conservation Society and the FSJ Rotary Club);
- a trail from Beatton River to Clayhusrt;
- trails around Blackfoot Regional Park;
- re-registration of Rimrock Trail;
- trails in Swan Lake area to improve bird watching opportunities;



- the new 8" fibre-optic line corridor between Tumbler Ridge and Dawson Creek could make a "good trail for cycling or another use";
- trail to 'Heat Vents' along Dinosaur Lake near Hudson's Hope;
- Extend the Elephant Ridge Trail all the way to Lone Prairie;
- develop and register a trail to Martin Falls;
- develop the 'historic McKenzie Trail' where Alexander McKenzie portaged around the rapids of the old Peace River; and,
- develop the railway route from Tomslake area to Dawson Creek as a multi-use trail use Kettle Valley Railway as a template.

Some specific trails and trail area concerns / requests for support are identified below. *Gundy Recreation Trails* – are used by ATVers and horseback riders. User conflicts are not a problem here as all users are very respectful of each other, The horseback rider recognize that they won't have trails if it weren't for the efforts of the ATV club. A problem with the registration of the trails here centres on the fact that the trails are located on lands which are within the Agricultural Land Reserve and additional applications and approvals for the development of the trails will need to be obtained prior to Mr. Bennett securing his approvals for trail registration.

Community linkages – cycling, walking or other non-motorized transportation along the highway between Dawson Creek and Taylor is dangerous and not advised. Individuals and groups are looking for support to develop trails to link communities in a safe and efficient manner rather than using the side of the highway.

Bear Mountain Nordic Club — users would like to see some support in promoting cross-country skiing to the local youth. The group currently work well with the neighbouring snowmobile club. They often work together sharing equipment and resources. Wolverine Nordic Club — indicated that they do not have any conflicts with the snowmobile club as that group generally goes up into the mountains. They would like to see funding made available for efforts to deal with the Pine Beetle kill. Would like to see the PRRD support them develop the Quality Falls trail as a wheelchair accessible trail. This group has a good relationship with the local industry who has given money and labour in the past to help deflect the impact of their changes to the landscape on the groups trails.

Charlie Lake Conservation Society – would like to see the PRRD become a partner in the trail from Charlie Lake to Fort St. John that they are currently designing and obtaining approvals for with the local

FSJ Rotary Club. As a club they would be interested in seeing funding available for signage/education of trails and park uses as well as Lake usage.

Wonowon community – mentioned that their horseback riding trails often start out over the old seismic lines which then take them into more open areas. With the assistance of



the local ATVers and snowmobilers they widen or cut back growth on the trails. Conoco has been very accommodating in this area for trail development and support. The group at the Open House suggested that information from the PRRD should come in Russian and German as well as English so all of the residents in this area have access to the information.

Chetwynd Outdoor Society – is interested in developing an extension to the Elephant Ridge Trail from Gwillim Lake Provincial Park to Lone Prairie for hiking and would like to have some support from the PRRD. They are also interested in developing a trail/lookout over the Martin Falls.

In conclusion the Open House events for the Parks & Trails Master Plan were successful as they provided excellent local points of view and many specific wants and needs. The information collected will provide a solid base to the Master Plan.
